Simile: A simile is a comparison of one thing to another using the words like and as.

Examples:

He's as busy as a bee.

She was as tall as a tree.

He ran like lightning.

Metaphor: A metaphor is a figure of speech that is used to make a comparison between two things that aren't alike but do have something in common.




The snow is a white blanket.




